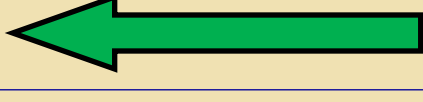

WASHINGTON (September 7, 2016)—The National Association of State Foresters (NASF) has released the [2016 State and Private Forestry Report](#) which includes success stories and an overview of emerging issues and trends that were recently identified by the state forestry agencies. The report, available for download at stateforesters.org, includes an analysis of a recent review of the state forestry agency strategies and assessments, collectively known as the Forest Action Plans. The Forest Action Plans, created more than five years ago, are the strategic roadmap for America's trees and forests. The 2016 State and Private Forestry report illustrates how the Forest Action Plans have helped direct limited resources to priority areas where they are needed most.

Based on the architectural trends, this is a post that will be updated frequently, as we'll probably have a new leader in the wooden skyscraper race every year or so from now on. This year the focus is on the new Brock Commons building at the University of British Columbia, which you may recall we visited last year. It was just topped off this past week, with full construction of the eighteen floors completed in just sixty-six days after the completion of the structure's concrete central cores.

To quickly and easily learn about Wood Innovations grants throughout the country, the Forest Service developed a map feature. The feature allows you to easily identify projects funded in a state or region and then obtain basic details of the funded projects. These details include contract information, brief project overview, funding amounts, and results --- if the project is completed. Sara, a Washington state resident, originally bought her house because of the giant cedar tree that graced her front yard. Over the years, however, the tree began to deteriorate, lose its limbs, and become a dangerous hazard to the neighborhood. The city insisted that Sara have the tree chopped down and removed. The homeowner agreed to cut down the 110-year-old tree, but instead of having it turned to mulch or firewood, Sara decided to give it a beautiful new purpose. She wanted to turn the old tree into a library.

The North Carolina Forest Service has teamed up with the Urban Forest Council on a web-based resource for cities and town that want to do something with urban trees that have been removed.

NC Ag Commissioner Steve Troxler says the Forest Service is attempting to address the problem through the Southeastern Urban Wood Exchange. This is a website that encourages the highest and best use of this wood by connecting cities that remove urban trees with local businesses or individuals who want that wood.

Safety Notes

[Chain Saw Safety—OSHA Quick Card](#)

Operating a chain saw is inherently hazardous. Potential injuries can be minimized by using proper personal protective equipment and safe operating procedures.

Before Starting a Chain Saw

- Check controls, chain tension, and all bolts and handles to ensure that they are functioning properly and that they are adjusted according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Make sure that the chain is always sharp and the lubrication reservoir is full.
- Start the saw on the ground or on another firm support. Drop starting is never allowed.
- Start the saw at least 10 feet from the fueling area, with the chain's brake engaged.

Fueling a Chain Saw

- Use approved containers for transporting fuel to the saw.
- Dispense fuel at least 10 feet away from any sources of ignition when performing construction activities. No smoking during fueling.
- Use a funnel or a flexible hose when pouring fuel into the saw.
- Never attempt to fuel a running or HOT saw.

Chain Saw Safety

- Clear away dirt, debris, small tree limbs and rocks from the saw's chain path. Look for nails, spikes or other metal in the tree before cutting.
- Shut off the saw or engage its chain brake when carrying the saw on rough or uneven terrain.
- Keep your hands on the saw's handles, and maintain secure footing while operating the saw.
- Proper personal protective equipment must be worn when operating the saw, which includes hand, foot, leg, eye, face, hearing and head protection.
- Do not wear loose-fitting clothing.
- Be careful that the trunk or tree limbs will not bind against the saw.
- Watch for branches under tension, they may spring out when cut.
- Gasoline-powered chain saws must be equipped with a protective device that minimizes chain saw kickback.
- Be cautious of saw kick-back. To avoid kick-back, do not saw with the tip. If equipped, keep tip guard in place.
